Dear Residents:

The City has been busy! As promised, the City is moving forward with infrastructure projects - the storm sewer maintenance program and our street rehabilitation program will begin in Spring.

We are also working on the creation of a Design Guide for our commercial districts. I encourage residents to attend our Planning and Zoning Meetings for details as the guide is developed.

A new crosswalk was painted on Taylorcrest at Blalock to allow a safer route for children crossing the street when going to and from school.

In January, Hedwig Village hosted the Harris County Mayors and Council Association (HCMCA) Meeting at the Goodman at the Village Towers located at 9655 Katy Freeway. The meeting offered a chance for all area Mayors and City Councils to come together and share contacts and discuss current issues facing municipalities today.

City Council amended our leash law to include electronic collars in the definition of a leash. However, please note, the animal must be within 15' of the Owner and must be under their control at all times.

Many thanks to the Garden Club of Houston as they awarded Hedwig Village \$5,300 to plant four, 65-gallon oak trees along Corbindale close to Hedwig Park.

From the Chief of Police

We have had several "jugging" crimes committed recently in our area. Jugging refers to a scheme in which an offender or group of offenders follows bank customers suspected of having large quantities of cash as they leave banks or other financial institutions. Offenders will frequently look for individuals that enter a bank empty-handed and leave carrying bank bags or boxes - an indication that they may have made a substantial withdrawal. Offenders then follow the victim to their next location and either attempt to take the bank bag by force or break into their vehicle (if they believe money may be locked inside). Victims are often small business owners or the elderly.

To avoid becoming a victim, follow these guidelines:

- Always be aware of your surroundings. If you see suspicious persons or vehicles in bank parking lots, notify bank personnel.
- o Conceal your bank deposit bags, coin boxes or envelopes as you enter and leave the bank.
- o Take your bank bag or envelope with you into your next destination. Don't hide it in your vehicle.
- o Avoid falling into routines, such as going to the bank at the same time of day carrying the same bank bag.
- After making a large withdrawal, don't go directly to your next destination. Drive around a random block to see if a vehicle is following you.

If you feel you are being followed, call 9-1-1 and drive to your closest police station.

Village Fire Department

Let's welcome Chief Miller in his new role as the head of our Village Fire Department! Chief Miller holds several fire certifications: Master Structure Firefighter, Instructor II, Fire Officer II, Incident Safety Officer, and Basic Fire Inspector. He is also a licensed paramedic and holds several other EMS certifications. Additionally, Chief Miller has served as the Village's Emergency Management Coordinator since 2009.

In his short time at his new position, he has already attended two Hedwig Village City Council meetings to provide a status update of the VFD. He has also met with HVPD Chief Gott in the first week of his new assignment to ensure a healthy collaboration with our emergency services in Hedwig Village. According to Chief Miller, "keeping the lines of communication open is necessary and beneficial to maintain a good working relationship with the communities we serve. By continuing to meet regularly moving forward, we will continue to strengthen our cooperative network of professionals."

The first week of Chief Miller's new role was spent following up with current projects such as the purchase of two new ambulances, repairing the annex station roof, and reroofing the new station roof to specifications of the remodel project for the fire station. His goal is to hire a consultant this year to prepare the station and operations for an upcoming Insurance Services Office (ISO) evaluation. Getting an early start on preparations will assist VFD in maintaining their ISO Class 1 rating.

The department operations shifts are also providing input into the direction of the department. Chief Miller stated "the department is eager and primed for a new direction, and we're hopeful for a great future. And I am very proud of the professionalism displayed by the members of the Village Fire Department. Operations and administrative personnel have been working hard to keep things moving forward. Their support and encouragement have overwhelmed me with optimism about where the department is heading and have made the transition into my new role easier than I expected. I am proud to serve with them."

Hedwig Village residents can be proud knowing that the men and women of the fire department are continuing to provide the great service they have come to expect!

Memorial Villages Water Authority

Stage One Water Conservation: Customers are asked to voluntarily conserve water and limit the irrigation of landscaped areas. Have your irrigation system checked by a professional. The check should include valves, sprinkler heads, and controller programming to ensure your system is watering in accordance with your watering days.

- 1. Even Ending Addresses: 0, 2, 4, 6, & 8 Monday, Wednesday, and Friday.
- 2. Odd Ending Addresses: 1, 3, 5, 7, & 9 Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday.

Bill Pay: The Memorial Village Water Authority offers multiple options to pay your bill. Online bill pay, auto draft, pay by mail, and pay by phone are several methods to pay.

Be Prepared for Water Emergencies: Before an emergency, check your water system. Locate the main cut off valve and operate it to verify it is in good working order. If a water pipe breaks, you may need to react quickly. The MVMA can demonstrate how to isolate your system in the event of a plumbing emergency.

Streets and Drainage Committee

The Streets and Drainage Committee continues to provide resident input about the city's infrastructure programs.

The city engineers at IDS recently published a request for bid for an expanded maintenance program for storm sewers, with the goal to select a vendor that will run TV of the current storm sewers and clean out any found debris. We expect to award this bid in March with work starting as soon as possible. The city's budget provides an annual amount for this program, so it is expected to be an ongoing maintenance program. The initial work will focus on the Echo Lane system and West to Bunker Hill.

A second bid has been sent out for the roadway/pavement improvements of Hedwig Way and Hedwig Circle. More detail on that will be provided to residents of the area once a bidder is selected.

IDS continues to review the Drainage Impact Analysis provided by LJA and is preparing recommended next steps for roadway and drainage improvements to the West Side infrastructure for further discussion.

The committee is comprised of interested residents: City Councilmember Patrick Breckon, Gary Schenk, Harry Craig, DuVal Dickey, and Taras Makogan. If you are interested in joining the committee, please contact city hall. Committee meetings are posted on the city calendar and are open for the public.

You can help with stormwater in the city by maintaining permeable ground on your property, planting trees to help retain stormwater, clearing and avoiding blocking the storm sewer drain inlets.

Anything that flows into the storm sewer system could clog the pipe and cause water to flood the streets and possibly homes. The same can be said about the creeks that flow through Hedwig Village. Yard clippings, tree branches, and trash **do not** belong in the creeks or storm sewer pipes. The potential for flooding is too great. Dispose of trash, yard clippings, and tree trimmings properly. Do not pour fats, oil, and grease down the drain at home. These items also cause flooding as they could slow the flow of water in the pipes. The pipes and creeks will not drain properly if there is anything other than water in our drainage system.

The 2022 RECYCLE/SHRED/DONATE Event was a huge success again this year. The event was hosted by the Cities of Bunker Hill Village, Hedwig Village, Hilshire Village, Hunters Creek Village, Piney Point Village, and Spring Valley Village.

- Trees for Houston provided 125 trees this year for the residents.
- Pioneer Paper provided shredding services and shredded 6.5 tons of paper.
- CompuCycle accepted 8,975 pounds of electronic items and devices for recycling.
- Memorial Area Ministries accepted gently used household items.
- The Hedwig Village Police Department collected approximately 75 pounds of unused medications for proper disposal.

The event is held every year at the end of October.

The 2023 event is tentatively scheduled for October 28,2023. The hours will be 8:00 a.m. to noon. The location will be City Hall, located at 955 Piney Point Road.







In February, City Council voted to become a "Tree City", a designation awarded by the Arbor Day Foundation to recognize cities that are committed to maintaining and growing their tree cover. In many ways, this recognizes the work that the city staff, council, and Parks Beautification Committee resident volunteers have been doing for many years and provides a framework to improve and expand the city's tree program.

Trees are an important part of the history of Hedwig Village and many local heritage trees pre-date the city's founding. A review of Google Earth

historical maps shows the loss of the urban forest that used to cover much of Houston. The Villages is one of the only areas of the city where there is still a prominent tree canopy. Over the years, the city has planted 179 memorial trees, as well as trees along Clifford, Gaylord, Echo Lane, and Campbell. The city maintains many more trees in Hedwig Park as well as the pocket park on N. Lou-Al.

What are the benefits of trees?

- Trees help absorb the sounds of traffic in urban areas by 40%.
- Trees absorb and retain water 1 mature tree absorbs 2000 gallons of rainwater per year.
- Neighborhoods with trees are seven to nine degrees cooler.
- Trees reduce energy costs up to 25% by shading buildings.
- Homes with mature trees have higher property values.
- Trees absorb carbon dioxide in the atmosphere.

The Tree Advisory Board will focus on the health of city trees and an ongoing planting program and also expand communications for residents about how to care for private trees. If you are interested in helping with the Tree Advisory Board and programs, please contact srouse@hedwigtx.gov.
